# Community and Economic Development (CED) Department (100)

## Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Program Narrative (09)-100% Grant Funded

The City of Allentown has submitted a Five-Year Consolidated Plan approved by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) the plan is used to identify housing and community development needs and to develop specific goals and objectives to address those needs over a five-year period. The Five-Year Consolidated Plan for the City covers the period of January 1, 2020, until December 31, 2024. The Consolidated Plan allows the City to continue to receive federal housing and community development funds as a direct Entitlement from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The City's Department of Community and Economic Development will administer the community development programs for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency So lutions Grant (ESG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Programs, and the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA). The HOPWA program provides social services and rental assistance for persons with HIV and AIDs. The City of Allentown entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to administer its HOPWA funds. The following are the funds awarded to the city in 2022:

CDBG - \$2,245,849.00 HOME - \$ 1,116,447.00 ESG - \$ 194,486.00

HOPWA - \$ 564,882.00

We will be using the 2022 grant award as an estimate for 2023.

HUD allows the City to use 20% of the CDBG funds for administrative fees in the amount of \$449,170.00, 10% of HOME funds for administrative fees in the amount of \$111,645.00 and 7.5% of ESG funds in the amount of \$14,586.45. These funds are used to cover the HUD staff salaries and any type of office administrative fees. Please see the CDBG budget worksheet for 2023.

The CED HUD department has also been working toward State grants and was awarded several in 2020, 2021 and 2022. We have applied for a State RHAB grant which will possibly give us another \$31,000.00 of administrative fees.

# **Revenue Input Assumptions:**

#### **HUD administrative funds:**

HUD allows the City to use 20% of the CDBG funds for administrative fund in the amount of \$449,170.00, 10% of HOME funds for administrative fees in the amount of \$111,645.00 and 7.5% of ESG funds in the amount of \$14,586.45. These funds are used to cover the HUD staff salaries and any type of office administrative fees. Please see the CDBG budget worksheet for 2023.

#### **State HUD administrative funds:**

We have applied for a State RHAB grant which will possibly give us another \$31,000.00 of administrative fees.

## **Expenditure Input Assumptions:**

<u>Personnel:</u> All costs associated with the HUD Grants Team. This consists of 7 employees. The HUD Dept. provides 10% of the salary reimbursement of the Director of Community and Economic Development.

#### **Operating Expenditures:**

- Advertisement (\$15,000): This line item includes the publication of all HUD Public Notices, Action Plans, CAPERs, and Environmental Reviews.
- Postage and Shipping Costs (\$50.00): Various HUD mailings
- Training and professional Development (\$10,000.00): HUD seminars or other educational seminars
- Operating Materials and Supplies (\$5691): office supplies
- General City Charges (\$60,883): General City Charges

• Federal Grant Subrecipients (\$2,981,426.00): The City funds approx. 45 non-profit each year with federal funds such as CDBG, HOME, ESG and HOPWA.

**CDBG** funds are also used for city improvements such as, ADA Curb cuts, Street lighting, Parks projects, Hazard Elimination and Demolition projects.

**HOME** funds we help with construction of low/mod affordable housing.

**ESG** funds are used to help several of the city emergency shelters with staffing and client programs.
