AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance providing for the expenditure of certain monies received by the City of Allentown from the repayment of loans made through the Rental Rehabilitation Program.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLENTOWN:

SECTION ONE: That the Mayor is authorized to expend Thirty-four Thousand Seven (\$34,007) Dollars received from the repayment of loans made through the Rental Rehabilitation Program in accordance with regulations issued by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

SECTION TWO: That the Mayor is directed to establish and maintain any and all such accounts and records as are necessary and to make such transfers as may be required to expend and account for said funds in accordance with HUD regulations.

SECTION THREE: That the funds be used for eligible HOME Investment Partnerships Program activities.

SECTION FOUR: That this act of the Council of the City of Allentown is undertaken pursuant to Act 292 of 1974 in accordance with the opinion of the Pennsylvania Attorney General (Opinion 75-23) which holds that Rental Rehabilitation Program Funds and its program income are General Municipal Funds for the purpose of Act 292 of 1974.

SECTION FIVE: That the Council of the City of Allentown authorizes the appropriation of Thirty-four Thousand Seven (\$34,007) Dollars in the following manner:



- **What Department or bureau is Bill originating from? Where did the initiative for the bill originate?**

Consolidated Grants Program Legislation consists of three ordinances and one resolution and originates in the Department of Community and Economic Development.

The attached legislation, from the Department of Community Development serves as the template for the City of Allentown's application for federal Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) and Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG) Program funds, including rollover and anticipated program income. Each piece of legislation serves a specific purpose, which when combined, contain all the recommended regulatory steps needed to apply for these federal funds. These are the same types of legislation presented to City Council every year. However, the actual dollar amounts, list of activities and funds available are different every year.

- **Summary and Facts of the Bill**

Ordinance #1

Summary: This legislation is required to close unspent CDBG accounts and "roll the funds" over to be used for the upcoming program year (July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010).

Ordinance #2

Summary: This legislation is required to establish expenditure accounts for the City budgeting system, in addition to listing all the activities/programs which will be funded for the 2009-2010 Consolidated Grants Program year. It provides the basis for the creation of the Action Plan which is submitted to HUD as the application for the CDBG, HOME and ESG program funds which the City receives every year.

Ordinance #3

Summary: This ordinance allows for the budgeting of payments received from the Rental Rehabilitation Program (a HUD program no longer in existence). The funds are budgeted each year to be used for other rental rehabilitation activities which comply with HOME program regulations.

Resolution #1

Summary: With this resolution, City Council is authorizing the City of Allentown to submit its Action Plan for the use of federal CDDB, HOME and ESG dollars.

These three bills and one resolution allow the City to apply for and then access \$4,852,944 in grant funds for the July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010 program year. All activities funded comply with the CDBG, HOME and ESG regulations as promulgated by HUD and allow the City to further its Community and Economic Development Initiatives. These bills provide the basis to complete the strategies of the final year of the City of Allentown's Consolidated Plan for the period July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010.

Ordinance #1

This ordinance allows for \$ 734,065 to be re-programmed as part of the funds available for the 2009-2010 program year. Funds are rolled over for a variety of reasons, but mainly because the program/activity is complete and costs were not as great as originally anticipated, or an alternative funding source may have been identified. At times, agencies decide to refuse their allocation if they have difficulty raising the additional funds necessary to run their program/activity. This legislation has no adverse financial impact on the City and the General Fund.

Ordinance #2

This ordinance provides the City the ability to expend \$4,852,944 in federal funds to complete a variety of activities including housing rehabilitation, homeownership, public services, administration of the programs, etc. This legislation has no adverse financial impact on the City and the General Fund.

Ordinance #3

This legislation will allow the City to expend \$34,007 in funds on the rehabilitation of rental units in the City. This legislation has no adverse financial impact on the City and the General Fund.

Ordinance #1 Federal Community Development Block Grant Program funds.

Ordinance #2: Federal CDBG, HOME and ESG dollars, rollover funds and anticipated program income

Ordinance #3: Repayment of Rental Rehabilitation funds

Resolution : allows the grant application for CDBG, HOME and ESG funds to be submitted

- **Priority status/Deadlines, if any**

These three bills and one resolution have a high priority status. Failure to submit the application to HUD by May 15, 2009 could result in the loss of this money.

Ordinance #1 Priority Status: High Priority. Needed to submit application for federal funds to HUD.

Ordinance # 2 Priority Status: High, application needs to be submitted to HUD by May 15th and the Action Plan cannot be completed until City Council approves this ordinance, which approves the programs and activities to be funded during the upcoming program year. City staff then use this information to develop the actual Action Plan following HUD's very specific protocols.

Ordinance #3 Priority Status- High. this resolution allows for the budgeting of funds to be used for the rehabilitation of rental units within the City.

Resolution- Priority Status- High-With this resolution, City Council is authorizing the City of Allentown to submit its Action Plan for the use of federal CDBG, HOME and ESG dollars.

- **Why should Council unanimously support this bill?**

Ordinance #1: Why Should Council unanimously support this bill? This legislation allows additional funds to be available to complete the myriad of activities described in Ordinance #2. Furthermore, this allows old accounts, which are no longer active, to be closed.

Ordinance #2 Why Should Council unanimously support this bill? The City has again followed the scoring process approved by Council and used in the past to develop this budget. In addition, funding decisions were made by complying with HUD's regulations, which require the City to address concerns/needs noted in its five year Consolidated Plan (approved by Council and HUD in 2005).

Ordinance #3: Why should Council Unanimously support: Allows for additional funds to be budgeted/spent to provide low interest loans to rehabilitate rental properties in the City.

Resolution: Why should Council unanimously support ? This resolution allows us to submit an application to bring additional grant dollars into the City.
