Allentown EAC 2025 Executive Summary

The below list of bullet points serves as a short-form summary of what we were able to accomplish during the 2025 year. The following sections of the report provide much further in depth descriptions with sources, context, and additional items.

1. Be advised as to environmental issues within the City of Allentown

- Conducted litter-reduction research, including review of the City's trash survey, discussions with SWEEP, and analysis of the Litter Assessment Study to inform 2026 recommendations.
- Received and evaluated major environmental presentations, including:
 - 2023 Greenhouse Gas Inventory (Penn State LCAP)
 - Citizen science tools for air quality and heat monitoring (CivicSciTech)
 - Little Lehigh Watershed Stewards winter salting impacts
 - Muhlenberg College Climate Action Planning Final Presentations
- Submitted advisory recommendations and letters of support on topics including Act 537 sewage planning, invasive species/herbicide reduction, and heat-monitoring initiatives.

2. Encourage sustainable design and the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, including the use of renewable energies

- Provided support to the continuation and approval of the Electric Vehicle Pilot Program
- Provided support and participated in the Climate Action Plan procurement and contract approval process. Developed a list of priorities to be included in the plan.
- Provided letters of support for resilience and climate-monitoring grant applications.
- Developed the process for review and submission of AEAC input to the Allentown City Planning Commission (ACPC) on proposed land development and subdivision plans

3. Protect and preserve natural resources within the City of Allentown

- Developed and distributed tree-education brochures in collaboration with Promise Neighborhoods of the Lehigh Valley to be used in support of the Jordan Heights Urban Forestry Initiative
- Worked with Lehigh Valley Audubon to evaluate bird strikes in downtown Allentown
- Provided advisory input to Green Buildings United to draft a letter to Allentown developers encouraging use of birdglass

4. Maintain possible uses of open land in the City of Allentown

- Provided recommendations and support to ZONE Allentown ensuring land-use, open-space, and sustainability considerations were identified during the drafting process.

5. Promote community environmental programs

- Launched allentowneac.org, a centralized, accessible public site for EAC materials and outreach
- Participated in public-facing environmental programs including UNIDOS Humankind Day, Muhlenberg's EcoFest, Earth Day, and the Parks and Recreation Master Plan.
- Supported and participated in Round 2 of the Youth Climate Action Fund
- Strengthened regional collaboration through ongoing participation in the Lehigh Valley EAC Network Steering Committee
- Expanded the City's Bird Town participation through statewide outreach, mini-grant support, and regional coordination with the Bird-Friendly Habitat Recognition Program.
- Helped develop curriculum for the Jordan Heights tree-planting and urban forestry training,



AEAC 2025 Goal Review

1. Collaborate with the City's Sustainability Coordinator on implementing energy efficiency and renewable energy programming (Tinku)

The major projects leading into this year were the EV Pilot program as well as the implementation of the Energy Management Plan. Due to the Trump Administration's pause on federal funding, these programs were initially uncertain. To advocate for these initiatives, Tinku attended a press conference³ in April hosted by the Climate Action Campaign that included local officials and community leaders. Her remarks⁴ expressed that the AEAC fully supports the mayor's call to action, emphasizing that federal funding is essential for advancing the city's energy efficiency efforts.

The Energy Management Plan has not seen any advancement as a technical assistance provider has not been assigned. However, the free energy audit assessment⁵ from Siemens was completed and provided to the City's sustainability coordinator.

Despite the turbulence in the beginning of the year, the necessary approval for the EV Pilot program by the City Council occurred through Bill 73⁶ on August 20th, 2025. The original award was supplemented with an additional \$60,000 for the installation of eight Level 2 chargers under the 2024 AFIG round 2⁷ announced in July 2025. It is anticipated that these vehicles as well as the charging infrastructure will be installed and operational in 2026.

2. Collaborate with the Da Vinci Science Center's Environmental Committee to improve upon environmental education, awareness, and stewardship (Tinku)

They have met multiple times throughout the year. They are continuing to advocate and collaborate with other stakeholders in the valley like Green Buildings United. In July, the EAC's newest member was appointed in Brandon Swayser⁸. Brandon is the Director of Environmental Science and Living Collections at Da Vinci Science Center.

3. Collaborate with Promise Neighborhoods of the Lehigh Valley (PNLV) on the Jordan Heights neighborhood tree planting and beautification program (Tinku)

This goal was built off of a workforce development grant award⁹ to Promise Neighborhoods of the Lehigh Valley (PNLV). The AEAC spring intern from Muhlenberg Kaitlyn Linton researched and provided the AEAC's expertise to the PNLV team in the form of

educational materials¹⁰. The brochures titled “Benefits of Street Trees in Your Neighborhood” and “Property Owner’s Guide to Shade Trees” will serve as a community resource to Allentown residents and the PNLV team. The City of Allentown submitted a letter of commitment to the program detailing its support¹¹. The program is anticipated to run in 2026.

4. Collaborate with Birdtown PA and PA Audubon Society to continue the City of Allentown’s involvement as a Birdtown (Tinku)

Following last year's designation as a Gold level Birdtown, the AEAC first took initiative to spread the word on this achievement. While the City of Allentown did not cover it on their outreach, following an interview with Tinku by LehighValleyNews.com, a story was produced¹² in May of 2025.

We also provided a letter of support¹³ to Bird Town PA in their efforts to apply towards a Community and Partnership Grant (C2P2) through DCNR to support a mini-grant program for our Bird Towns across the state. In May we submitted a brief document¹⁴ at the request of Heidi Shiver, the president of Bird Town PA, regarding our development of a sustainability framework for the City’s road projects as well as the tree brochure for inclusion in their flyer.

In June, Kyle attended the Lehigh Valley Bird Town Clutch Meeting¹⁵ at Muhlenberg College with representatives from several EACs/Bird Towns in the region. There was also representation from the Pennsylvania Audubon Society, where the Lehigh Valley is a chapter as well. The primary outcome of this meeting was the introduction of the Bird-Friendly Habitat certification program¹⁶. This program is an effort that recognizes and supports properties (yards, balconies, or community spaces) that provide food, water, shelter, and nesting habitat for birds using sustainable practices. The City of Allentown Parks and Recreation Department Office agreed to be one of the locations where residents can apply online and pick up their sign.

In November, Brandon attended the Annual PA Bird Town Summit with approximately 70 other representatives from Bird Towns across the state. The 2025 Annual Report detailed our accomplishments and was submitted for status evaluation¹⁷.

5. Collaborate with various community organizations to develop and implement educational programming relating to air quality in Allentown with a focus on environmental justice (Maria)

The state of Pennsylvania sponsors an EJ Mapping and Screening Tool¹⁸. This uses more than 30 environmental, health, and socioeconomic indicators to help map areas that are disproportionately impacted. This map¹⁹ indicates how serious of an issue this is in the City of Allentown. The PA DEP also awarded local non-profit the Unidos Foundation a \$50k grant for EJ related community outreach²⁰. Unfortunately, it is believed that this grant was tied to federal dollars, and is no longer active. The AEAC tabled alongside the City's sustainability coordinator during UNIDOS sponsored Humankind Day²¹ on May 31st.

An AEAC led event is anticipated to be held in February 2026 to report on the findings of Lehigh Valley Breathes and other air quality related initiatives.

6. Improve upon the AEAC's communications with intent to increase community engagement, transparency, and accountability (Kyle)

The most significant progress toward this goal was the completion of the Allentown EAC website. Craig secured the domain allentowneac.org, which now directs to a Google Site that greatly advances the ETAs above. With a clear public-facing home base, community members and City staff can easily access current files and resources, improving engagement. The site also strengthens transparency by bringing all EAC-related materials together in one place. Finally, maintaining an organized space for finalized and approved motions helps ensure future members stay informed and the EAC remains accountable to its goals long term.

7. Investigate further strategies and recommend the implementation of actionable plans to reduce litter in the City building on the historical work completed and collaboration with the City, including SWEEP. (Peter)

There were two major relevant items this year related to this goal. First, the City began its new trash contract²² on June 1st which brought some changes to waste operations. For example, the "solar bellies" originally installed in 2011, were removed²³ and replaced with steel and other receptacles. Prior to this contract, a City-wide survey occurred which delivered several major data points²⁴. The most notable to the EAC in the context of litter reduction efforts was "62% support a requirement that all trash must be bagged and placed in a trash can to reduce litter." This prompted us to investigate this initiative.

During our September meeting, representatives from the SWEEP department attended and discussed the idea of containerization. In short, we not only learned that there are a series of complications related to enforcement of this requirement, we also learned that the City-wide survey was primarily completed by residents in the West End of Allentown. With different

circumstances in Center City versus the West End, that data was no longer considered to be an accurate representation of community position. LehighValleyNews.com was able to obtain through a Right To Know Request, a Litter Assessment Study²⁵ completed by City of Allentown interns. This report had numerous takeaways that will be used to inform our next steps in litter reduction. This will be something to pursue in the 2026 year.

8. Organize, manage, and communicate information regarding changes to the primary water distribution system (Lehigh County Authority) and the stormwater/municipal sewer systems (City of Allentown) during the 2025 year (Peter)

On September 3rd, 2025 City Council adopted the updated Act 537 Plan through Resolution 113²⁶. This resolution ensures the City is following PA regulation for maintaining sewage facilities to prevent contamination of waters and/or environmental health hazards with sewage wastes. We provided a letter of support²⁷ for this, that was submitted during the recommendation period to inform the plan.

9. Work with Allentown's Sustainability Coordinator to develop a sustainability framework for implementation of the Safe Streets for All Action Plan (Tinku)

The City Council approved the SS4A plan with R38²⁸ after months of work by the consultants and the review committee. During the meeting, the Michael Baker International team presented a detailed presentation²⁹ of the plan. Following this, Muhlenberg intern Kaitlyn Linton presented the developed sustainability framework³⁰ to the City Council and the Public as additional commentary to the plan. The SS4A plan includes within it a recommendation that the City utilize this framework and compile sustainability scores onto the SS4A dashboard.

Although the City has frequently implemented elements of a complete streets approach, it does not yet have a clear and comprehensive complete streets policy. The hope is that adopting this policy would include the proposed sustainability framework.

10. Support the City on Earth Day programming (Kyle)

This event which occurred on April 25th unfortunately rained out early on. Due to lack of preparation for a tent, and only paper materials, the AEAC was unable to table. Unfortunate.

AEAC 2025 Secondary Optional Goals

- Participate and engage with the development of the City of Allentown’s Climate Action Plan (CAP)**

The funding to procure this plan was approved in the 2025 budget. In May, the EAC received presentations from students in a Muhlenberg College Local Sustainability Class. They focused on “advising the advisory council” and researched into different aspects of a Climate Action Plan. These reports will be utilized in the development of the CAP. Access to their reports and presentations are below.

Kyle sat as a non-voting member on the RFP selection committee. In October, the contract was awarded and approved to WSP USA Inc. by the City Council³¹. The EAC voted on and approved a list of priorities³² to be included in the plan as well.

- Participate and engage with the development of the City of Allentown’s Urban Forestry Master Plan and updated Tree Inventory**

The plan unfortunately saw some turbulence due to the Trump Administration and DOGE. However, funds were “unfrozen” and the contract for the Tree Inventory, Species Master Plan and Urban Forestry Master Plan was approved through R39³³. These plans are now in the process of being implemented beginning with the tree inventory and community input.

- Support the Sustainability Coordinator in the submission of the 2025 CDP disclosures and corresponding grant opportunities**

Our Sustainability Coordinator was able to submit on behalf of the City of Allentown and we were awarded a “B”³⁴. Considering that you need a climate action plan for an “A”, we are pleased with this outcome.

- **Support the Sustainability Coordinator, the manager of Civic Innovation, and Penn State students in the efforts associated with the funding/technical assistance application to the Center for Collaborative Heat Monitoring and the landscape analysis to study citizen science tools for heat/air quality data**

In January the AEAC held a special meeting to allow for the presentation³⁵ of the 2023 City of Allentown Greenhouse Gas Emissions report³⁶ by Lakeisha Riley and Baylee Balogh this work was supported by Penn State's Local Climate Action Program (LCAP).

Also, in March, Penn State CivicSciTech program students presented to the AEAC some preliminary landscape analysis work on citizen science tools that Allentown could use to measure heat and air quality. This work was the subject of a heat resilience grant the City applied for that the AEAC provided a letter of support³⁷ towards. In April, another presentation was given to all interested City staff on how citizen science tools can help advance public health and sustainability goals in our community, particularly in addressing air quality challenges and the urban heat island effect.

- **Support public awareness and outreach efforts by Movement Moves Media on climate related issues and action**

As one of the awardees of the first round of the Youth Climate Action Fund, Movement Moves Media recorded both Tinku and Kyle as a part of their goal to develop environmental educational media content on various topics. The City of Allentown posted a few of these videos on their social media. Other topics touched on included lead pipes, air quality, food deserts, and solar power.

- **Collaborate with the regional EAC's through the LV EAC Network Steering Committee and support the planning of an annual conference**

The LV EAC and LV EAC Steering Committee met many times throughout this year. Progress was made in the development of an LV EAC network. In June, there was a Summer Social and Roundtable³⁸ that saw considerable advancement in the progress towards the collaborative platform. In October, the fall annual conference was held on the topic of Plastics Reduction. A presentation was given from our very own Sustainability Coordinator, Veronika Vostinak³⁹. The meeting focused on sustainable food service practices and reducing single-use plastics in restaurants and events, with discussions centered around implementing reusables, compostable options, and closed-loop systems. The interactive discussion included challenges from various initiatives, including enforcement of ordinances, customer behavior, and technical limitations, while exploring strategies for community education and business engagement. The group concluded by discussing next steps, including recommendations for local government

involvement and potential funding opportunities to support restaurants transitioning away from single-use plastics.

- **Collaborate with the Coalition for Appropriate Transportation (CAT) on updating bike ordinances in the City code**

This was a success, with several major updates⁴⁰ to the ordinance being passed⁴¹. The AEAC supports these updates in the sense that we support investments in alternative forms of transportation to reduce emissions.

- **Collaborate with the Little Lehigh Watershed Stewards (LLWS) on investigating and implementing potential strategies to reduce the impact of road salt into our watershed**

The Little Lehigh Watershed Stewards presented⁴² to the AEAC in February. They also provided some slides on cost benefit savings⁴³. The AEAC must continue to collaborate with LLWS to develop an official report to provide to the City regarding salt reduction.

- **Participate and engage with the Blue Zones Project in Allentown with a focus of interest into the sector policy subcommittee as either a member or co-chair/chair.**

This has not occurred. However, Kyle and BZP Policy Lead Robert have been in communication if any collaboration opportunities arise.

- **Collaborate with LVPC on their numerous climate action initiatives and reports that will be occurring in the 2025 year**

The AEAC has attended and provided input at several of the Lehigh Valley Planning Commission's (LVPC) climate action planning workshop events in their efforts to develop a Greater Lehigh Valley Regional Climate Action Plan (RCAP). This included workshops on identifying a prioritizing climate action strategies that both Kyle and Tinku attended and a workshop on Deploying Electric Vehicle Infrastructure that both Kyle and Craig attended⁴⁴. We will continue to participate and stay informed.

- **Participate in the grant selection committee for the second round of the Youth Climate Action Fund through Bloomberg Philanthropies**

This allocated funding from Bloomberg Philanthropies proceeded as planned. Kyle served on the review committee for the applications. The City of Allentown recently announced the awards through press release⁴⁵.

- **Do a more thorough analysis of the City budget to address potential areas to divest from that are detrimental to the environment (ex pesticide use)**

This was partially investigated by our summer intern in her research into invasive species. Following her report, a letter was submitted to the City encouraging the reduction of

herbicide use. Then, a resolution⁴⁶ was passed by City Council stating a joint commitment of the Department of Parks and Recreation and AEAC to maintain limited use of herbicides in public parks, and to continue to pursue sustainable land management alternatives in order to protect the wellbeing of Allentown’s local ecosystem.

- **Engage with LLWS and Old Allentown on community cleanups/tree planting initiatives**
No progress has been made on this initiative, with plans to increase next year.
