The Vibes Print Version Has Been Discontinued

The Vibes began as anewspaper titled "I NEED A NAME" in March of 1958. Manor resident Lonnie Peffer Wentling won the naming contest in April of 1958 with the name 'MANORTONES." At that time, Lonnie was a fifth grader at the Midway Manor School. Other names considered were "MIDWAY MANORETTES," 'MANORHITS,' and "MIDWAY MANORISMS." Lonnie won an Arvin Table Radio, valued at \$34.95. For years the newspaper was published monthly and it remained the Manortones until the 1980's when it was renamed The Manor Vibes.

65th Anniversary Special - From the 65th Gala By Richard Wilburn

65 YEARS AGO IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF MISERY MANOR, AS IT WAS CALLED BY THE RESIDENTS BECAUSE OF THE MANY ISSUES AND THE LACK OF ATTENTION PAID TO THE COMMUNITY AT THE TIME BY THE CITY, A GROUP OF CIVIC-MINDED NEIGHBORS LED BY OLIVER JACKSON MET IN HIS BACKYARD TO DISCUSS HOW TO REMEDY THE PROBLEM.

AFTER MUCH DISCUSSION, IT WAS DECIDED TO FORM A COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION WITH THE GOAL OF ADVO-CATING AND REPRESENTING THE CITIZENS OF THE MIDWAY MANOR COMMUNITY AND PROVIDING MUCH NEED-ED SPORTS PROGRAMS FOR THE KIDS.

IN NOVEMBER OF 1957, MIDWAY MANOR COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION WAS FORMED AS A NON PROFIT CORPORA-TION.

THEIR MOTTO WAS "TO FOSTER NEIGHBORLINESS, GOODWILL AND FRIENDSHIP AMONG THE RESIDENTS OF MID-WAY MANOR AND TO ADVANCE, ENGAGE AND ASSIST IN SOCIAL AND CIVIC PLANS, PROGRAMS, AND SERVICE FOR THE BETTERMENT OF IT'S MEMBERS AND THE RESIDENTS OF MIDWAY MANOR".

THE FIRST GOALS OF THE ASSOCIATION WAS TO FORM A SPORTS PROGRAM FOR THE HUNDREDS OF CHILDREN WHO RESIDED IN THE MANOR. BASEBALL AND BASKETBALL TEAMS WERE FORMED AND ALTEMOS OIL COMPA-NY WAS THE FIRST OF MANY BUSINESS SPONSORS TO PROVIDE UNIFORMS AND EQUIPMENT FOR THE TEAMS THAT STARTED IN 1958.

OVER THE YEARS, MANY BUSINESSES GAVE SUPPORT, MONEY AND TIME TO THE MIDWAY MANOR SPORTS PRO-GRAMS. THEY INCLUDE JOE'S BATTERY AND TIRE, A-TREAT BEVERAGE AND SAMER INSURANCE. THIS SUPPORT CONTINUES TO THIS DAY WITH LONG TIME SPONSOR JOE'S BATTERY & TIRE, KOHUT FUNERAL HOME, SNYDER & WILES AND OTHERS.

AFTER GETTING SPORTS OFF THE GROUND, THE ASSOCIATION BEGAN TO TACKLE A MYRIAD OF NEIGHBORHOOD ISSUES RANGING FROM POOR DRAINAGE, UPPAVED ROADS, LACK OF STREET LIGHTING AND MANY OTHER ONGO-ING ISSUES. MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION BEGAN ATTENDING CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS AND ADVOCATING FOR CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS, EVENTUALLY FORCING THE CITY TO START TENDING TO THE NEEDS OF THE MIDWAY MANOR COMMUNITY.

SINCE THESE EARLY BEGINNINGS, MIDWAY MANOR COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION HAS WORKED HARD TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE FOR THE RESIDENTS OF MIDWAY MANOR. WE,-- ALL EAST SIDE RESIDENTS,-- STILL HAVE AN UP HILL BATTLE WORKING WITH THE CITY TO GET THE ATTENTION WE DESERVE.

ANTHONY IACOCCA BEGAN STREET LAYOUT AND DESIGN FOR MIDWAY MANOR IN THE LATE 1930'S . THE FIRST STREETS TO BE DEVELOPED WERE FROM CLUB AVENUE WEST TO VAN BUREN ST., FAIRMONT ST. SOUTH TO HIGHLAND STREET. MR. IACOCCA'S WANTED EVERY HOUSE ON HIS STREET TO BE DIFFERENT.

MR. IACOCCA MADE PLANS IN HIS ORIGINAL DESIGN TO HAVE LAND SET ASIDE FOR A PARK AND COMMUNITY CENTER, A SCHOOL AND A CHURCH.

IN 1939, THE FIRST HOUSE CONSTRUCTED WAS THE DANENBURGER'S HOME AT 1120 NORTH WAHNETA. THE SEC-OND HOME WAS THE GORMAN HOME LOCATED ON THE SOUTH WEST CORNER OF CONGRESS AND WAHNETA STS (THE TAGG'S HOME TODAY) AND THE THIRD HOUSE WAS THE FRITZ HOME LOCATED ON THE NORTH WEST COR-NER OF CONGRESS AND WAHNETA STS.

POINT OF INTEREST: JIMMY GORMAN, KIM TAGG'S GRANDFATHER, LAID OUT THE ELECTRICAL GRID AND THE LO-CATION OF THE UTILITY POLES FOR MR. IACOCCA AND IN RETURN RECEIVED HIS LOT FOR THE PRICE OF \$1. ALSO THE SPELLING OF WAHNETA STREET WAS "WAHNETAH" ON THE ORIGINAL PLAT.

The Snack Shed

The Snack Shed, located at the park has been a source of funds for Midway Manor for over 40 years. It is open during any events sponsored by MMCA at the park including Spring and Fall Soccer, Halloween, Neighbor to Neighbor and other events.

We rely on a network of volunteers to help during these events. There are various tasks from manning the front taking orders to working the griddle or the fryers. The Shed menu has a varied assortment of food from hamburgers, hotdogs, French fries, pierogies, ice cream, sodas to candy and snacks. We also accept donations of goods that can be utilized such as paper goods, plasticware, soda, Gatorade, coffee, tea, etc. Other items we accept are small appliances in good condition such as coffee makers, crockpots, pots and pans.

How to Prevent Catalytic Converter Theft

This pricey exhaust system part contains precious metals, and thieves want it more than ever

Catalytic converter theft is on the rise and to a shocking degree. Theft of this pricey part rose 325 percent nationwide between 2019 and 2020, according to the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB). In New York City, the police department reported that converter thefts had risen from 211 to 802 over that same period, and jumped to 3,705 in 2021.

The catalytic converter is an <u>exhaust system</u> part that's necessary for your car to pass safety and emissions inspections in many states. Some vehicles have more than one, and the NICB says replacing stolen converters can cost as much as \$1,500 to \$3,000. <u>Trucks</u>, which are higher off the ground, are at greater risk, simply because the converters are easier for thieves to access. The <u>Toyota Prius</u>—a popular gasoline-electric hybrid with two converters—is a favorite target, according to the NICB. Also at risk are <u>street-parked vehicles</u> and trucks parked overnight in unattended lots.

Catalytic converters contain platinum, palladium, and rhodium—expensive precious metals that react with exhaust gasses, heat up a ceramic honeycomb element, and convert harmful combustion byproducts, such as nitrogen oxide and carbon monoxide, into less harmful gasses. Prices for the three metals have spiked over the past few years. According to Kitco, a website that tracks precious metals trends, the current price for an ounce of platinum is \$1,000, while palladium costs more than \$2,300, and rhodium—which is extremely rare—costs more than \$20,000.

Assuming a thief can access the underside of a vehicle, converters are easy to remove with battery-operated power tools, or in some cases, even simple hand tools. Scrapped converters can then be processed to remove the precious metals, which is what makes them so valuable to scrap metal dealers and thieves. According to a recent article in Waste Advantage magazine, a typical catalytic converter contains 3 to 7 grams of platinum, 2 to 7 grams of palladium, and 1 to 2 grams of rhodium. (There are just over 28 grams in 1 ounce.)

Some states—including the Carolinas, Indiana, and Texas—have passed laws requiring scrap metal dealers to ask for vehicle titles or other documentation before they'll buy used catalytic converters. A number of other states have proposed legislation. But for people worried about getting ripped off now, NICB says there are some steps that can be taken to protect your car.

Anti-theft devices: Catalytic converter anti-theft devices are available from various manufacturers and range from steel plates protecting the underside of the vehicle to cages made from steel cables that are meant to discourage thieves from stealing a converter by making removal more time-consuming, which in turn increases the thief's exposure to getting caught. Alarms— both full vehicle systems and special converter-specific ones—also can be effective deterrents. Talk with a trusted mechanic to see what they recommend for your vehicle. Anti-theft solutions can be pricey, but they often cost less than a new catalytic converter.

Secure parking: Park overnight in a locked garage, or in a well-lit, enclosed lot if you can. If you're parking in a driveway, consider installing motion sensor lights. If you're parking on the street, try to pick a well-lit one with plenty of traffic.

Report theft: Even if you drive an older car and it doesn't seem worth it, alert local law enforcement and your insurer if your catalytic converter does get stolen. Statistics can help legislators pass laws that make it tougher for thieves to sell stolen parts.

NICB says insurance policies can cover replacement of a stolen catalytic converter, but only if there's a comprehensive policy in place. Comprehensive insurance covers events like theft and weather damage, but many people who have older, less valuable cars don't carry it because the premium isn't worth the potential payout if something goes awry.

Most people who are leasing or making payments on a car are required to carry comprehensive coverage, but whether or not someone files a claim on a stolen converter depends on the policy's deductible and how much it costs to replace the part. For example, if you have a \$1,500 deductible to keep your monthly premium low, you wouldn't file a claim on a repair that cost \$1,200.

The best option, though, is prevention. Even if your insurance covers replacement of a stolen catalytic converter, parts delays and repair shop backups are common right now, meaning you may have to wait a while for repairs.
